SAMHSA is an agency of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS). With a fiscal year 2004 budget of more than \$3.2 billion, SAMHSA's Centers and Offices administer and fund a rich portfolio of grant programs and contracts that support States' efforts to expand and enhance prevention programs and to improve the quality, availability and range of substance abuse treatment and mental health services in local communities where people can be served most effectively. Through its three Centers and supporting Offices, SAMHSA engages in program activities to carry out its mission: to build resilience and facilitate recovery for people with, or at risk for, substance use disorders and mental illnesses.

CMHS leads Federal efforts in expanding the availability and accessibility of high-quality, community-based services for adults with serious mental illnesses and children with serious emotional disturbances.
