Comprehensive Addiction Recovery Act Requirement

The Comprehensive Addiction Recovery Act (CARA) establishes requirements to meet the needs of substance exposed and substance affected infants and their families with the development of a Plan of Safe Care for infants born and identified as being affected by substance abuse (legal or illegal), withdrawal symptoms or a Fetal Alcohol Spectrum (FAS) Disorder.

What is a plan of safe care?

Plans of safe care describe the services and supports needed to comprehensively address the needs of infants prenatally exposed to substance and their families. These federally required plans must identify family members’/caregiver’s health care needs, including substance use disorder treatment services; developmental interventions for the baby; as well as services and supports needed to promote family stability. Plans of safe care incorporate all treatment plans developed by the multidisciplinary professionals serving the family. The plan of safe care is developed with the parents and all service providers. These plans may or may not require involvement of child welfare agencies.

Steps We Need to Take Together

- Provide pregnant women access to comprehensive medication assisted treatment.
- Establish guidelines and standards for treatment which includes preparing mothers for the birth of their infant who may experience withdrawal syndrome and potential involvement with Child Protective Services (CPS).
- Beginning the development of a plan of safe care prior to the birth event.
- Timely information sharing and monitoring of infants and families across multiple systems.
- Consistent hospital notifications to CPS.
- Develop a set of questions and responses that will help CPS hotline workers determine if a case should be opened in order to assess the risk and protective factors and safety concerns for the infant and mother.
- Provide comprehensive assessments of the infant’s physical health and the mother’s parenting capacity, physical, social and emotional health.
- Develop a thorough discharge plan that provides a multi-disciplinary plan of safe care.

What does this mean for Mandated Reporters?

Mandated Reporters are required to make a referral to a Public Children Services Agency (PCSA) when an infant is identified as exposed or affected by substance use, which places the infant at risk of serious harm.

Important to note: CARA has included both legal and illegal substance abuse; meaning if an infant is exposed and/or affected by a substance which is legal (alcohol, prescribed medications, antidepressants, etc.) these infants are at risk just as an infant who is impacted by the abuse of illegal substances. Infants can and do withdrawal from prescribed legal medications and per rule if these infants are experiencing withdrawal symptoms, have a positive toxicology result or are identified as having Fetal Alcohol Syndrome, mandated reporters are expected to make a referral to their local PCSA. The PCSA must then, based on the information provided by the referent, decide whether to open a case for investigation.

With CARA in place it is the hope that when these referrals are made the additional information regarding the Plan of Safe Care (ex: compliance with MAT, taking medications as prescribed, no other issues/concerns, etc.) is provided to the PCSA. If information is not provided or available at the time a referral is made, the PCSA is required to open a case for assessment/investigation. CARA is not changing what referrals should be called in, instead the focus is on being able to be able to make better screening decisions based on the additional information (i.e. The Plan of Safe Care) provided by the referent.

Completing a Plan of Safe Care

The Plan of Safe Care that is created will address actions and services for the infant and family’s needs that support the family achieving long-term recovery.

When developing the Plan of Safe Care, the family, case managers, and other agency providers should keep in mind that the post-partum period is a time of “unique vulnerability” for the mother due to:

1. Increased stress associated with motherhood, infant care, sleep deprivation
2. Limited social support and resource availability
3. Increased financial demands
4. Pain and physical recovery from delivery
5. Physiologic transition from pregnant to non-pregnant state

POSC Coordination should include the following:

1. Assess the health and substance use disorder needs of the infant, family and caregiver.
2. Obtain an Authorization for Release of Information (ROI) from the subject or parent/guardian of the infant/other children for whom the information is being requested, when it is necessary to obtain/share information and/or to initiate referrals.
3. Ensure that the Plan of Safe Care addresses:
 - a. The health and substance abuse treatment needs of the infant and caregiver; and
 - b. The needs of the other family members affected by the substance abuse.
4. Monitor the Plan of Safe Care to determine whether referrals are made and delivery of appropriate services to the affected infant, family or caregiver.

Definitions:

Substance Affected Infant: A child under the age of 12 months who has any detectable physical, developmental, cognitive, or emotional delay or harm which is associated with a parent, guardian or custodian’s abuse of a legal or illegal substance; excluding the use of a substance by the parent, guardian, or custodian as prescribed.

Substance Exposed Infant: A child under the age of 12 months who has been subjected to legal or illegal substance abuse while in utero.

Important to Remember!!! Any infant who has been identified as being affected by or exposed prenatally to substances is required to have a plan of safe care in place. This includes prenatal exposure associated with a mother’s Medication Assisted Treatment for substance use disorders.

5. Develop the Plan of Safe Care addressing the needs of the infant, other children in the home, mother, and other family members.
6. Identify and obtain agreement regarding a responsible party for referrals, provision of services for the mother, other caregivers, infant and other children in the home;
7. Identify and obtain agreement regarding a responsible agency to monitor the Plan of Safe Care, if the case will not be opened for child welfare services; and
8. Complete the written Plan of Safe Care using the Plan of Safe Care form. Implement and monitor the Plan of Safe Care.
 - a. Follow up with the family and other parties involved in the plan.
 - b. Initiate services and/or follow up on substance use disorder treatment and/or any other recommendations from the substance use disorder assessment.
 - c. Refer and/or follow up with medical or other providers regarding services for the infant and other children in the home.
 - d. Follow up regarding the referral for the developmental screening for the infant and other children in the home.
 - e. Incorporate the plan of safe care into the case plan

What to include in the Plan of Safe Care

1. Needs of the mother:
 - a. Health care
 - b. Identification by the mother of a consistent and stable primary caregiver
 - c. Medication management
 - d. Pain management
 - e. Breast feeding, if recommended by the physician.
 - f. Substance use and mental health, should include the following:
 - i. Timely access
 - ii. Engagement, retention and recovery supports
 - iii. Appropriate treatment (i.e. gender-specific, family focused, accessible, medication assisted treatment, trauma responsive)
 - iv. Depression/anxiety/domestic violence
 - v. Identify and assist the mother in accessing the appropriate assessments and treatment services.
 - g. Parenting/family support:
 - h. Coordinated Case Management/Home Visits to assess/address infant care, parent/infant bonding, nurturing, mother’s understanding of the special care needs of the infant(s) and ability to provide such care, parenting guidance and skill development, safe sleep practices, and maternal support.
 - i. Childcare
 - j. Benefits/eligibility determination
 - i. Employment support
 - ii. Housing
 - iii. Transportation
 - k. Supportive network (having relationships and social networks that provide support, friendship, love, and hope)
2. Needs of the Infant:
 - a. Identification of a consistent pediatrician/healthcare provider
 - b. High risk follow-up care

- c. Referral to specialty care, as indicated
- d. Developmental screening and assessment
- e. Linkage to Early Intervention Services

3. Needs of other children in the home:

- a. Identification of a consistent pediatrician/healthcare provider
- b. Developmental screening and assessment
- c. Linkage to Early Intervention Services

4. Needs of other family members:

- a. Substance use disorder assessment and treatment
- b. Mental health assessment and treatment
- c. Pain management
- d. Medication management
- e. Parenting skills (i.e. bonding, nurturing, understanding of the special care needs of the infant and the ability to provide it, safe sleep practice, etc.)
- f. Their ability to meet the care and protection needs of the infant and any other children living in the home.
